EPIPEN & EPIPEN JR.

Drug Classification: Adrenergic agent

BACKGROUND

Pharmacodynamics

Epinephrine binds with alpha and beta-receptors, producing increased blood pressure, increased heart rate, and bronchodilation.

Indications

• Allergic reactions and anaphylaxis with evidence of severe respiratory distress, increased heart rate, hives, and/or decreased blood pressure.

Contraindications

None in the emergency setting

Cautions

• Use with caution in patients with cardiovascular disease, hypertension, closed-angle glaucoma, diabetes

DOSAGE and ADMINISTRATION

- 1. Describe the procedure to the patient and obtain consent, if possible.
- 2. Pull off safety cap.
- 3. Wipe injection site with alcohol.
- 4. Place tip of EpiPen/EpiPen Jr. on exposed thigh (anterior or lateral) at right angle to leg.
- 5. Press hard into thigh until auto-injector mechanism triggers, and hold in place for several seconds.
- 6. Remove the EpiPen and discard in sharps container.
- 7. Massage injection site for 10 seconds to enhance absorption.
- 8. With persistent severe anaphylaxis, additional injections may be necessary. Consult with medical control if a second dose is indicated.

ADVERSE REACTIONS/SIDE EFFECTS

Anxiety, headache, cardiac arrhythmias, hypertension, tremors, chest pain, nausea, vomiting.

NOTES

¹ Adults (>60 lbs): **1:1,000 epinephrine (Adrenalin) 0.3 mg IM** (one EpiPen)

Children (<60 lbs): 1:2,000 epinephrine (Adrenalin) 0.15 mg IM (one EpiPen Jr.)
